Some questions that can be helpful to ask when developing your practice's carers' strategy

- 1. In your next practice/multidisciplinary team (MDT) meeting, ask all the members of the practice/MDT to attend to agree the process for handling carers
 - Do you have a carers' strategy?
 - How do you currently identify and record who is a carer in your practice?
 - What is each person's role in the practice team for identification?
 - How could this be improved by each member of the team?
 - Do you have a carers' lead in the practice? This could be a non-clinical representative
 - Do you have a carers' register and how do you keep it updated?
 - Do you have a palliative care register? If so does this also highlight if the patient has a carer? If so how do you support their bereavement needs and carer assessment after their loved one has died?
 - Do you have a structured and timely method for the practice to know when a person has died? Is this reviewed by an MDT? a simple call or letter to the carer with an offer of support can be invaluable
- 2. How friendly do you feel your practice is to carers?
 - What support is offered in the practice and via which different media?
 - How do you encourage self-reporting?
 - How do you signpost carers to the different local resources?
 - Do you hold any events, for example, an annual tea?
 - How do you involve your patient participation groups in developing your carer strategy
- 3. How do you work with local external organisations in your community to help identify carers?
 - Are there any local carer or voluntary organisations you can partner with on raising awareness or training carer champions?
 - Does your CCG/Local Authority provide any carer champion training?
 - How do you triangulate knowledge from other members in primary care: e.g. local pharmacies, community nursing etc.
 - Do you have a list of support (including bereavement services) available to all staff?
